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President's Message

Drawing the Circle Wider through Grace

We can all agree that we're still in a season of uncertainty and many of us are still fearful of what's to come. The last thing we're thinking of, as health authorities still warn us, is drawing our circle wider. Fear & uncertainty tend to make us draw our circles smaller, draw a line in the sand, and create rules & laws that make it clear who is in and who is out.

Romans 5:1-2 says, "Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we boast in the hope of the glory of God." In chapter 4 of Romans, Paul talks about how Abraham was justified by faith, stating in verse 16 that "therefore, the promise (that Abraham would be heir of the world) comes by faith, so that it may be by grace and may be guaranteed to all Abraham's offspring—not only to those who are of the law but also to those who have the faith of Abraham. He is the father of us all." Abraham couldn't see how wide his circle would become, but he had faith that God would do what was promised. Just as Abraham, we can't see how wide our circle becomes or what other circles we intersect with – what lives we touch.

But we have faith, just like Abraham, that God will be with us and that the grace we receive through Jesus Christ will help us overcome the fear and uncertainty of these times. So how do we as the Florida chapter of The Fellowship widen our circle? We should strive to meet new people constantly, establish ourselves – our chapter, our organization – as givers of value, commit to supporting the Florida Chapter as well as the National Fellowship, reach out to people on a regular basis, and know the kind of people we want to reach out to. As we emerge from this pandemic and start to once again draw our circle wider, we have an opportunity to make changes and not go back to the way we've always done things.

We need to reach out to others in our community that are in need of the opportunities that we share through our Church Music Workshop. Reach out. Make a new connection. And invite them to attend with you.

Dr. Andrew Minear Adult Choral Clinician

With appearances across the USA, Dr. Andrew Minear is an active conductor, music educator, and choir leader. His conducting experience includes children's, church, community, middle school, high school, collegiate, and professional choral settings. Dr. Minear is the Director of Choirs at Lake Buena Vista High School in Orlando and the Artistic and Executive Director of Orlando Sings.

He previously served as the Director of Choral Activities at the University of Alabama where he led the choirs, oversaw the graduate choral conducting program, and taught courses in conducting and choral literature. Why I Come to "Music Camp" by Christian Faux — our New Youth Dean

I must admit I did not go to a lot of different summer camps when I was a kid. I went to the Florida Fellowship Youth Workshop and a church camp at Warren W. Willis, ironically enough. I had troubles at other camps, often feeling overwhelmed and lost in the crowd. As a naturally introverted individual, even as a child, I would hate seeing everyone gathered around and socializing and making friends and feeling left out. Although my introverted nature did not abandon me at "Music Camp" I did not feel as alone, not by a long shot. Everyone at camp for all of the last sixteen years I've been attending and volunteering have made great efforts to make everyone feel welcome and included.

What makes this special is that it comes down from all levels. The clinicians often go to great efforts to remember the names of all the kids at camp, an effort which really endears the campers to them. The youth team all make an effort to make sure the campers feel welcome and involved, especially in their classes and dorm groups. Even some adults making a point of sharing meals with the campers. I think this is one of the special traits and what makes the camp *work* in the end. We do a LOT at camp. We do choral work where a choir made of different groups of students of different ages learn, often to memory, 4 or 5 songs often in different languages. We write, practice, and perform skits and plays. We learn to play and perform worship music at vespers at night. We learn to dance, to sign language, to create art, and I don't think any of that would be possible if it weren't for the unique way that the camp forges a family in less than a week.

In a time where we tend to feel increasingly isolated, where we tend to carve out increasingly small social niches for ourselves where we don't need to feel challenged by opposing ideas or people, and **especially** in the wake of this pandemic where isolation became a socially required norm for a time, having a place where people can come together and not just socialize, but develop bonds as strong as family, worship God together, and find an odd sense of peace born out of the chaos of the week is something endlessly special, and something which I, personally, have only experienced at the Florida Fellowship Annual Church Music & Youth Workshop.



Christian is currently the Minister of Youth & Young Adults and Technology Director at FUMC, Lancaster, PA. He received his Master of Divinity from Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary in 2019. He is the son of our current Past President & Membership Chair, Jeff Faux. The Florida Chapter of the Fellowship is proud to sponsor annual scholarships for college students majoring in music, and for first-time Adult and Youth attendees to our Annual Church Music Workshop and Youth Music Camp. At our recent Fall Chapter Council Meeting, the Council discussed the continued need to support and advertise our scholarship programs especially the scholarships for our first time Adult & Youth attendees. A motion was approved to offer additional first time attendee scholarships for our 2022 Workshop. For the Memorial Scholarship, which covers full registration and room & board for a first time youth attendee, we will be offering up to three scholarships. For the Rosie-Jean Scholarship, we will be offering one full scholarship (registration and double room & board) to a first time adult attendee and up to three (3) scholarships that will cover a first time adult attendees registration fee, with room & board being the attendees responsibility. For both the Memorial & Rosie-Jean Scholarships, there are application requirements — letter of recommendation from church music director and a statement of desire to attend. Preference for the full (registration and room & board) Rosie-Jean scholarship will be given to part-time church music directors that have a financial need. If you know of any youth or adult that would like to attend but may be hindered because of financial need, please let them know about this opportunity.

Grant K. Pulen Music Scholarship

Named for a founding member of the *Florida Chapter of the Fellowship*, it provides an annual award of \$2,000 to a full-time student majoring in music at an accredited college or university. The 2022 deadline for the submission of an application and the supporting materials is May 15, 2022. The Grant Pulen Scholarship will be awarded on Friday, June 17, 2022, at our Closing Workshop Concert.

Rosie-Jean Scholarship

Named in honor of Roselyn Langdale and Jean Bennett, two well-known members and mentors of the Florida Chapter, this year's scholarship will provide the Registration Fee for up to three (3) first-time attendee at the Adult Church Music Workshop and Full Registration (registration fee and double room & board) for one first-time attendee, with preference being given to a part-time church music director. The 2022 deadline for the submission of your application and the supporting recommendation is May 15, 2022.

Memorial Scholarship

Established in memory of illustrious Florida Chapter members who lived their lives in distinguished service to God in worship, and to others in fellowship, this year's scholarship will provide Registration and Room & Board fees for up to three (3) first-time youth attendees at the Youth Workshop.
